Dear colleagues

When I look back on 2023, it is clear that it was a very demanding year on our hospitals and on staff working across the Saolta Group. Attendances at our EDs and MIU increased again over the course of the year, but even in that context



we managed make significant progress in improving patient care where needed. Two of the areas that I look at closely are access for patients through our emergency departments and access for patients to elective care from our waiting lists and these are among the key areas where significant improvements were made in this 12 months. We have reduced the overall number of patients awaiting admission on Despite the sustained demands you have continued to deliver a trolley in our hospitals by 11% this year and nearly14% reduction in the number of patients awaiting OPD appointments.

Our access problems have not been resolved, and will require significant attention again in 2024, but I would like to acknowledge the really great work that has been done in both these areas and in many others across all of our hospitals.

I have previously mentioned the reforms taking place in the HSE with the establishment of the six new Region Health Areas. These reforms have been advancing over the past year and we are likely to see significant changes to the way our services are organised in 2024. While this may not affect everyone's daily working life, it will affect many. Making the new Health Regions work in ways that make sense for our patients is largely in our hands. The challenge for us all is to ensure that we don't just change the structure through which we deliver care but that we fundamentally change the way care is delivered.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and New Year, and to thank you for all your hard work in 2023. I look forward to working with you again in 2024.

Dear colleagues

I want to personally thank all our staff for another year of professionalism and commitment to patient care. 2023 has seen some of the busiest periods of emergency activity. Our hospitals continue to experience high levels of urgent emergency care over the past



number of months, which has proved to be very challenging to manage. We continue to prioritise key initiatives and interventions to optimise and support patient flow for the coming winter on all of our hospital sites. We will use all available bed capacity to support the demands on the service.

the highest quality patient care and support to each other as colleagues.

I also want to commend you all on the ongoing work to reduce waiting lists. Despite the pressures each hospital has faced, the ongoing efforts to reduce waiting lists and waiting times are bearing fruit and I want to thank you all.

In 2023 Saolta experienced a 15% increase in OPD referral rates going from 146,400 in 2022 up to 168,700. Despite this additional referral demand, we removed 180.000 patients from outpatients waiting lists. We reduced our average wait time by 23% for an outpatient appointment down from 12.2 months to 9.3 months. We surpassed our OPD total waiting list target of 92,000 and decreased the numbers waiting to 90,861 (14%) across the group of hospitals. We achieved a 10% reduction in IPDC and 19% reduction in GI scope.

I also want to update you on some infrastructure developments across all our hospitals which will support and enhance our service delivery.

Many of the challenges we are experiencing require long term solutions and the major infrastructure developments delivered across the group this year will go a long way to ensuring our population's healthcare needs can be met into the future. In February, the new eight bed Palliative Care Support Unit opened under the governance and operational management of RUH.

Adding capacity to the system is a top priority and some key highlights this year include the opening of new 12 bed ward and the progression of new 50 bed ward block in PUH. In GUH we were delighted to open the new state of the art Saolta Radiation Oncology Centre earlier this year which will enhance cancer services for the region. SUH continues with the hospital enabling works for the ward block development and car park expansion which will add much needed capacity and MUH has progressed to the next stage of planning for the new ED/AMU build. And in LUH progress has been made in the Development Control Plan which sets out key infrastructure needs for the hospital. All of these projects require huge individual and collective effort, thank you to everyone involved.

Finally I wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas and I look forward to working with you in 2024.

Sláintecare Integrated Fund (SIF Round 2):

GUH have been successful in an application for Sláintecare funding to test a new "Acute Integrated Pre-Admission Virtual Navigation Hub". The primary aim of this initiative is to decrease Emergency Department attendances by 10%. This will be achieved by navigating patients, referred by GPs, to alternate:

- Emergency care within the hospital setting such as AMAU and ASAII
- Urgent care pathways within the hospital
- Urgent outpatient appointments from GUH OPD and in the specialist integrated care community hubs

We are hopeful that this service will go live in Q1 2024.

Modernised Care Pathways (MCPs):

The implementation of Modernised Care Pathways (MCPs) is central to transforming the delivery of scheduled care services and has been a significant component of the Department of Health's **Waiting List Action Plan 2023**. It is progressing on a phased basis with priority focus on specialties with the most significant waiting lists.

Haematuria and Lower Urinary Tract Symptoms (LUTS) have been successfully piloted and embedded across Saolta and are being scaled up and implemented across the HSE. The hospitals and community services have been working together to co-design the implementation of the Continence pathway across Saolta, CHW and CHCDLMS. All Orthopaedics Virtual Clinics are operational.

Phase 2 MCPs for Saolta:

There are a number of additional pathways which are planned to be progressed in 2024. Recruitment had commenced and work is ongoing to review and validate as part of the 2024 National Service Plan.

Members of Saolta attended the MCP workshop in Dublin on the 30th November where the Chronic Disease pathways, Home Dialysis, VFAC were showcased.

Project Management Training

The Saolta PMO in conjunction with the PMOs in CHW and CH CDLMS developed a training course on Project Management for Community of Practice participants in response to a needs analysis. This Introduction to Project Management was held over three lunchtime sessions and feedback from participants was very positive.

Portfolio Management Offices in CH CDLMS and CH East are providing 'Fundamentals of Project Management' training for staff across their regions. This opportunity is being extended to Saolta and CHW staff who have an interest in project management.

PMO Priorities

The Draft Saolta Strategy Addendum 2024 is under consideration by the Executive Committee and will be prioritised / progressed in the context of the emerging Health Regions.

Saolta PMO also continues to work on the Saolta Integrated Governance Project (SIGP) which is implementing the Medicine and Perioperative MCANs.

Work is ongoing on the Enhanced Community Care programme and the National Clinical Programmes in collaboration with our community partners.

Introduction

As the Clinical Director of the Saolta University Health Care Group I am delighted to confirm that the group wide Managed Clinical and Academic Networks (MCANs) are now in place for Medicine and Perioperative. Together with the existing Cancer and Women and Children's MCANs they will be working with the Executive Team and Hospital Management Teams in leading the development of Clinical Services.

I would like to welcome the Team Members to their new roles and to thank all those who have been involved in the development and implementation on behalf of the Saolta University Health Care Group.

Background and Context

The Saolta Integrated Governance Project is one of the seven key priorities in the Saolta University Health Care Group Strategy 2019-2023.

In January 2020, the Saolta Group launched the Cancer and Women & Children's Managed Clinical Academic Networks (MCANs). These were initially established on a trial of concept basis to test out the evolving integrated governance model. The objective of the MCANs is to strengthen the governance and oversight of clinical services and improve integration between hospitals in order to deliver safer and more effective patient care across the region. This objective will be achieved by:

- Bringing decision making closer to the point of care
- Streamlining clinical pathways
- Clarifying responsibility and accountability
- Integrating planning and service planning
- Optimizing resources
- Using KPIs to improve quality, drive performance, and ensure efficiency

Initial Benefits of MCAN Model:

An evaluation of the initial Integrated Governance Phase was carried out in 2022 and a number of benefits were of the MCAN Model were identified:

- Greater integration through hospitals working together
- Better support for clinical specialties
- A focus on support for Quality Improvement
- Enhanced engagement with the National Programmes and
- Shared learning and a standardised approach to clinical care
- An improved focus on performance
- Better engagement with patients and staff

Work is continuing on clarifying the roles and responsibilities between Hospital sites and the MCANs in relation to Quality and Patient Services, HR, Finance and Education/Training.

The MCAN Management Teams similar to the Hospital Management Teams are now included in the Saolta Performance & Accountability Framework. This involves reporting to the Group Executive Team who report into the National Hospitals Office.

To ensure regular information regarding the implementation of the MCAN model is made available to all a communications plan has been developed with existing and emerging MCANs in conjunction with the Saolta Communications Department.

Next Steps for MCAN Phase 2 roll out

The Saolta Executive Committee formally approved moving towards Phase 2 of the project on May 05 2023. Phase 2 involves the implementation of the Perioperative and Medicine MCANs as well as the exploration of a fifth MCAN with the proposed involvement of Laboratory, Radiology and HSCPs. The Perioperative and Medicine MCANs are now operational and initial engagements are commencing in relation to the proposed fifth MCAN.

Women's and Children's Managed Clinical and Academic Network (MCAN)

As we come towards the end of 2023, it is timely to reflect on achievements and work undertaken across the Group over the last year and to plan for 2024 priorities for the Women's and Children's MCAN.

Quality and Patient Safety

The Saolta Maternity and Gynaecology Conference, held in March was a huge success. Supported by NWIHP, with key note speakers from across the Saolta Group as well as National delegates, topics covered included Clinical Governance and Adverse Outcomes, Maternity Risk Stratification and OEST (Obstetric Event Support Team). In addition, the Saolta Neonatal conference was held in February, 2023 with over 100 delegates attending from the Saolta Group itself and some travelling from other hospitals outside Saolta. The speakers covered a wide variety of neonatal topics and generated a lot of excellent questions and discussion.

The aim for 2024 is to host a Quality and Patient Safety Symposium for Paediatric Services in spring and work is underway in the development of the programme.

A Neonatology Conference has been scheduled on 07 March and the theme is "Standardisation of Neonatal care in a Group Setting" covering safety and quality.

Quality Improvement (QI)

Projects remains a key priority with many Quality Improvement (QI) plans in place and the outcomes of these projects will be showcased over the coming months. The following provides a summary of some of the QI projects that have been actioned by the MCAN and Hospital Sites:

•Saolta Paediatric Out Patient Department Scheduling **Proiect**

The MCAN have met with all hospitals in the Saolta Group to gather information on the processes and structure of the OPD Process - from receipt of the letter to structure of clinics etc. which will be reviewed for the group and shared learning/support to follow.

•Saolta Critically III and Injured Child Project

The Saolta Critically III and Injured Child Project (SCIICP) commenced in December 2021 and is now two years in progress. The aim of this project is to ensure that robust structures, systems, processes and resources are available in the Saolta University Health Care Group to effectively manage the critically ill and injured child. The objectives of the project are being achieved through a number of work streams.

•Hybrid model of Post Registration Children's Nursing **Education Programme**

The new innovative Hybrid Model of Post Registration Children's Nursing Education Programme in partnership with SAOLTA/TCD and Children's Health Ireland saw the first 7 Children's Nurses graduate from this new Children's Nursing Programme which they commended in Sept 2022. They were presented with a unique nursing badge which acknowledges their achievement.

This programme was a collaboration between Children's Health Ireland, Trinity College Dublin, Saolta and support from CEO, CDONM, CDONM CHI and Director of ONMSD.

Saolta Women's and Children's MCAN Annual Clinical Report (2022)

The Saolta Women's and Children's MCAN Annual Clinical Report (2022) has been published and it displays the vast amount of data collected from each of the sites to form the data trends across the Group.

This report includes all activities related to Maternity Services, Neonatology, Gynaecology, Paediatrics, SATU and CASATS in our 5 hospitals – GUH, LUH, MUH, PUH and SUH.

The report is designed into sections largely aligned along the subject areas as just referred to above. The activity for each hospital site has been shown separately, and in combination to represent the Group.

Cancer Managed Clinical and Academic Network (MCAN)

On the 20 October Minister Stephen Donnelly officially opened the Radiation Oncology Centre a state-of-the-art new facility which will provide advanced radiotherapy treatment for cancer patients across the West and North West. This much anticipated development has been planned for many years and supported by the National Cancer Control Programme with Dr Risteard O'Laoide, National Director, NCCP also in attendance at the opening. It was a proud day for all involved in bringing this vision to fruition.

Patricia Gleeson, Adolescent and Young Adult Clinical Nurse specialist and her colleagues from St James and Crumlin along with representatives from the Irish Cancer Society and the NCCP ran a really informative interactive study day in the newly opened Radiation Oncology building on 23 October. Speakers included Prof Owen Smith National Clinical lead CAYA, NCCP, Dr Peter McCarthy Paediatric and AYA Haematologist CHI @ Crumlin and St James. Other speakers included Dr Natalie Hession Principal psychologist GUH, Dr Helen Greally National programme lead for psycho-oncology and Dr Scheryll Alken Consultant Oncologist CHI and St James. The afternoon session provided opportunity to look at difficult conversations and how healthcare professionals might navigate these with a lively and informative workshop.

In the next few months we hope to collaborate with Childhood Cancer Ireland to develop facilities within our cancer services for AYAs undergoing treatment in the hospital.



Cancer Seminar Series:

The Cancer Seminar sessions began in November with Dr Natalie Hession, Principal Psychologist in Cancer Services Galway University Hospitals making a presentation on 'Psycho-Oncology A Vision for the West.' Dr Hession gave a very inspiring delivery of how we might improve psycho-oncology care in the West. She highlighted the development of the new psycho-oncology service in GUH. Dr Hession outlined innovative initiatives to capture and deliver psycho-oncology in the wider Saolta region including a psycho-oncology digital hub, teaching and training staff in psychological skills and patient talks and therapy groups. Other topics covered were psycho-oncology survivorship, psycho-oncology research and adolescent and young adult (AYA).

Our Urology Nursing team recently published their research on: 'Patient-Reported Enablement After Consultation With Advanced Nurse Practitioners: A Cross-Sectional Study' Robert McConkey, Louise Murphy, Therese Kelly, Rachael Dalton, Geraldine Rooney, Donna Coy, Michelle Healy, Melinda Meeker, Marie O'Loughlin, and Maura Dowling.

This paper is an outcome of the urology nursing research and journal club. The club was formed in 2021 as a urology nursing clinical academic partnership with the School of Nursing in the University of Galway.

The paper was presented at the Saolta Urology/Continence Nurses Network (SUNN) Conference on the 6th October in the Maldron Hotel in Galway, and was awarded second place. The urology team have further plans to present their research at the IAANMP (Irish Association of Advanced Nurse and Midwife Practitioners) conference, the IAUN (Irish Association of Urology Nurses) conference, and at the EAUN (European Association of Urology Nursing) conference in April 2024 in Paris.

The first placed poster at the SUNN conference, also came from the urology unit which involved the development of an E-form on Evolve for Catheterisation.

Rachael Dalton ANP Prostate survivorship has since moved on from the Prostate unit in Galway. We wish her well in the future, she will be missed.

Letterkenny University Hospital

An oncology research study performed in Letterkenny University Hospital was recently highly commended in the HSE Excellence awards. This research study, which ran for two years (2020-2022) investigated the feasibility, safety and efficacy of ANP-led care for patients receiving oral anti-cancer medications (OAM) in community settings.

The LUH team consisted of Dr Janice Richmond, Mary Grace Kelly CNM2 and Alison Johnson CNM2alongside colleagues in the University of Galway-Prof Andrew Murphy, Dr Patrick Murphy, Dr Laura O'Connor, Prof Paddy Gillespie, Dr Anna Hobbins and Dr Alberto Ivarez-Iglesias. Dr Janice Richmond and Prof Andrew Murphy were the principal investigators and CNM2 Mary Grace Kelly was a co-investigator. The study concluded that ANPs were appropriately placed to care for patients receiving oral anti-cancer medications and that assessments and care can safely be performed in community settings. Currently in LUH, all patients if stable at cycle 2 of their OAM cycle, are referred to the ANP-led OAM clinic and these clinics are held outside of the acute hospital two days per week.

Dr Janice Richmond and Mary Grace Kelly attended to present their short-listed work under the "Improving Patient Experience" Category. There were over 100 applicants to this category and the team were delighted to be highly commended for their work.

Organisation of European Cancer Institutions (OECI) **Accreditation Programme**

Since March 2023 working groups have been set up across the region to collate responses to the 345 standards across 9 chapters of the OECI manual. Quality improvement plans have been put in place thanks to the hard work of all the individuals involved across all levels and disciplines. As the OECI encapsulates the cancer trajectory of each patient the whole community of disciplines are engaged in the self-assessment process of the accreditation programme. An essential component of the process will be review of data relative to each hospital site by their nominated lead before submission.

Academic Office

Building on the strong foundation of medical education and training across the Saolta Group the Chief Academic Officer with the Academic Office has worked with the National Doctors Training and Planning department to secure its position as part of the Clinical Educator Pilot programme. This will allow for further development of the established group wide Hub and Spoke structure. As part of this pilot, Dr Bernadette Lynch has been appointed as Director of Medical Education and Training and additional; support will be provided to the site Associate Academic Officers. Prof Catherine McHugh, SUH, Dr Cyril Rooney, MUH, Dr Paul O'Hara, PUH, Dr Caroline Richardson (LUH) will continue in their roles to provide accountable educational leadership on the clinical sites.

The first meeting of the Saolta Group Medical Education and Training Committee took place in Galway on 05 December. This expanded support will allow for more strategic development of education across all sites in Saolta.

Letterkenny University Hospital

The 11th Annual Multidisciplinary Research Symposium at Letterkenny University Hospital

Sligo University Hospital

This year's 24th Annual Multidisciplinary Health Research Conference and second Early Stage Health Researcher Forum organised and hosted by the Research and Education Foundation were held in Sligo University Hospital under the banner of "Health Science Expanding the Boundries" and aimed at disseminating and encouraging clinically relevant health research. They certainly met the brief.

120 people attended the 24th Multidisciplinary Health Research Conference which began with a rousing talk by Tommie Gorman calling for a reappraisal of the healthcare system to make sure it is fit for purpose going forward. This was followed by high calibre speakers including Prof. Aiden McCormick (Hepatologist St. Vincent), Jack O'Meara (CEO Ochre Bio), Dr. Kate Jack PhD RGN (Nottingham UH), Prof. Cathy McHugh (Endocrinologist SUH), Dr. Claire McEvoy PhD RD (Queen University), Prof. Alex Miras (Endocrinologist, Ulster University), Katriona Kilkelly (Obesity Dietetics, GUH) and Daniel Davey (Performance Nutritionist) addressing the topics of liver health, diabetes and weight management. Patient representatives from Type-1-diabetes Support Group thrivebetes.ie and Irish Coalition of People Living with Obesity also gave talks sharing their experiences of living with health challenges adding insight and human context to the discussion. During the breaks there was a chance for health researchers and health care professionals to mingle and browse the exhibition of 50 posters show casing local research.

Some of this local research was presented to 70 attendees at the 2nd Early Stage Health Researcher Forum. From greater than 50 submissions 12 people were invited to present their research in slots of five minutes and receive feedback from a panel of experienced health researchers. A wide array of research was presented, demonstrating the quality and breadth of local multidisciplinary health research. Attendees commented on both quality of the presentations and usefulness of the critical feedback.

Medals were awarded for best presentation at the 2nd Early Stage Health Researcher Forum, won by 2nd Year BST GIM SUH trainee Dr Jimmy William and best poster in three categories: Medical Health Care; Nursing, Midwifery and Health and Social Care and Health Academic Research. These were won by 4th Year UG Medical Student Paddy Murphy, Cancer Research Nurse Margaret Burke and Lecturer in Occupational Safety and Health at ATU Sligo Margaret McCallig BSc, MSc, PhD Candidate, respectively.

In 2024, the 25th Annual Multidisciplinary Health Research Conference preceded by the third Early Stage Health Researcher Forum will take place in SUH on the 28th and 29th of November!

Donegal family is urging the public to know the signs of sepsis.

Moninne Bradley, from Killygordon in Co Donegal, was left fighting for her life last year as the result of the rapid spread of sepsis.

Had it not been for the quick actions of her sister, Nurse Orla Noonan, she would not have survived.

In the weeks leading up to her collapse, Moninne had been fighting an infection and had taken a course of antibiotics and steroids to combat it. When she later developed spots on her throat, she believed it was a side effect of the antibiotics. She returned to her GP and was started a course of tablets to treat thrush.

On the day before her hospitalisation, Moninne went to work as usual. Still concerned about a swelling that appeared on her neck, she intended to return to her GP as a precaution the following day. Click here for more.

Galway City Cardiology Hub

The Enhanced Community Care pathway for Cardiology has been up and running since March 2023 in the West of Ireland under the joint governance of the Saolta University Health Care Group and Community Healthcare West.

Work carried out by the Galway City Hub has resulted in 300 patients being removed from the Galway University Hospitals wait list through a range of initiatives including list validation, a chest pain initiative, setting up of appointments at the hub instead of the hospital and the redirection of GUH hospital heart failure wait list to the hub.

"The ECC programme has been absolutely transformational for the care of patients with chronic cardiovascular disease. We have seen 298 new patients in the hub and had 1,300 clinical contacts since we started," said Dr Susan Connolly, Cardiologist with UHG who also leads the cardiology service in the Galway City Integrated Care Hub. 'Thinking of You' Memory Boxes for Organ Donors'





During Organ Donation Awareness Week (20-27 May) Saolta officially launched the award-winning Hospice Friendly Hospitals project 'Thinking of You Memory Boxes for Organ Donors.'

The 'Thinking of You Memory Boxes' is a new initiative within the Saolta Group dedicated to Organ Donors and their families. Memory boxes can be a significant part of the journey of donor families who have lost a loved one. The initiative aims to support patients in their final days of life and their families into bereavement and beyond.

The tree of life is the symbol stamped on the box representing the continuation of life that a deceased individual has given to another. Each Memory Box contains; a lavender bouquet, a small candle, a 'thinking of you' memory cloud which is placed in the donor's hand during their final hours, a hanging emblem in memory of the donor with the inscription 'when it rains, look for the rainbows', and inkless handprints created at the bedside to provide comfort during a sensitive time. Rainbow Project at RUH



The RUH Rainbow Project is a Quality Improvement Project that aims to promote an open, non-judgemental and inclusive healthcare setting for those who identify as LGBTI+ (Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex +).

The RUH Rainbow Project evolved from an identified clinical and service need within RUH in November 2022. This prompted a collaborative approach from the Endoscopy Triage Nurse and Patient Advice Liaison Service Coordinator to gather information pertaining to national and global policies, documents, guidelines, supports and education available for healthcare staff in relation to various issues faced when accessing healthcare by members of the LGBTI+ community. The conclusion of this research identified there are no set healthcare practice or education guidelines on this topic.

As a result, the need for the provision of education and awareness training for all services and departments within RUH was highlighted.

Michelle McDermott, Endoscopy Triage CNM2 and Rainbow Project lead said, "We identified the HSE Rainbow Badge project as an initiative we could introduce to the hospital community as a starting point to address these identified needs.

"An education program for staff was developed. The education session includes information on pronouns, terminology, gender expression and orientation, inclusion at clinical and service level and the meaning of the Rainbow badge. The HSE rainbow badge will be presented to staff who attend an RUH Rainbow education session, complete the HSEland LGBT+ Awareness and Inclusion Training: the Basics" training and sign a declaration form."

Christine Rohan, patient Advice and Liaison Service Coordinator and Rainbow Project lead added, "Wearing the badge is a responsibility, it is not just a tick box exercise, when staff are wearing the Rainbow badge, it means that they are there to listen, help and signposted to other services where appropriate. We have held seven education sessions and have had over 30 people in attendance to date. These RUH Rainbow Education Sessions remain ongoing.

"As part of the continuous learning we have completed the LGBT Ireland Champions program also attended the LGBT Ireland National Healthcare conference and network events."

"The RUH Rainbow project is still in its infancy but thanks to the support from our Director of Nursing and the staff in RUH, it has grown from strength to strength. We cannot do this without the support of staff in the hospital and we would like to thank them for their support so far and hope we can all work together to keep improving and developing this programme into the future."

NAS Pathfinder goes live in Letterkenny and Galway

Pathfinder, a National Ambulance led service designed to safely keep older people who 112/999 in their own home rather than taking them to a hospital emergency depart has gone live in Letterkenny and Galway.

Pathfinder improves outcomes for older people by providing safe alternative care at home rather than in hospital and will be provided by National Ambulance Service staff working with colleagues from Letterkenny University Hospital.

Robert Morton, Director of the HSE National Ambulance Service said the expansion of the NAS Pathfinder Model is part of a plan to offer different groups of patients an alternative pathway other than presenting to a busy emergency department.

"The National Ambulance Service is very pleased with the outcomes for individual patients being achieved by this service and we are delighted to be working with Letterkenny University Hospital and University Hospital Galway to support the expansion of the Pathfinder model to these parts of the country. The NAS Pathfinder model is improving outcomes for older people by offering safe alternative care pathways for many older people in their own homes who might otherwise have to be conveyed to a busy Emergency Department. Pathfinder is enabling NAS to play an increasing role as an integrator of health service delivery by also connecting 999 patients with the increasing range of community services being developed by the HSE to support the needs of older people."

JJ McGowan, GM Operations West with NAS said, "Many patients who present to the emergency department have non-urgent care needs that could be treated elsewhere. Overall, Pathfinder has shown that it is a safe and acceptable service for older people who dial 999/112 with low acuity complaints."

The Pathfinder 'Rapid Response Team' respond to 999/112 calls for older people (65 years and older) in their homes. The older person is assessed by both an Advanced Paramedic and Occupational Therapist/Physiotherapist. Where safe, the team supports the older person at home rather than transporting them to emergency department, by linking with a wide range of alternative hospital and community services. Pathfinder also operates a 'Follow-Up Team' (Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy) which provides immediate home-based rehabilitation, equipment provision and case-management in the subsequent days following a 999/112 call. On average two thirds of patients seen by Pathfinder following a 999 call have remained at home rather than being brought to the Emergency Department.

On a recent visit to University Hospital Galway, Health Minister Stephen Donnelly said, "I'm delighted to see the rollout of Pathfinder in Galway. I met the team and can see the great work they will be doing for patients across Galway. We've seen the results of pathfinder where of the calls responded to, as many as two-thirds of patients were able to avoid being taken to the Emergency Department and could be successfully treated at home with appropriate follow-up care."

UHG first Centre to introduce **Nerve Blocking Probe**

UHG has become the first centre in Ireland to introduce a nerve blocking probe which uses liquid nitrogen to freeze nerves and remove pain post surgery.

The CryoNerve blocking probe delivers liquid nitrogen at a temperature of around -190 degrees from the tip of the device during invasive surgery.

This device is applied to the nerve underneath each rib, freezing it and temporarily stopping its conduction. These nerves are one of the main sources of pain after chest surgery, and cryo nerve block helps by temporarily shutting off the nerve. Once frozen, it thaws over a period of months, reducing pain for patients recovering from major surgery.

Dr Alan Soo, Consultant Cardiothoracic Surgeon at University Hospital Galway, who has introduced the technology to Ireland for thoracic surgery says the device also has the potential to be rolled out to cardiac surgery. Click here for more.

New videofluoroscopy equipment at MUH

A new high specification videofluroscopy service has been introduced in Mayo University Hospital. Michael Browne from Ballina, Co Mayo was the first patient to be treated with the new state of the art diagnostic technology at the hospital.

The investment in this new equipment and software will improve patient outcomes at the hospital by providing high quality diagnostic imagery to guide the management and treatment of patients with swallowing difficulties.

The videofluoroscopy service is led by the Speech and Language Therapy (SLT) Department and is delivered in close collaboration with the Radiology Service at MUH.

Videofluoroscopy is a specialised x-ray that shows what happens when you eat and drink. It is a detailed examination of the swallow and is considered the 'gold standard' for the assessment of swallowing difficulties, which is known as dysphagia.

"Not everybody will be suitable for this injection but if you find the right patient and start them on this treatment the effect is so transformational. UHG Trials New Technology for Patients with Heart failure



University Hospital Galway has completed the final phase of an innovative clinical trial which reduces the hospitalisation rate for patients living with heart failure.

The trial which allows patients to be treated for heart failure from home has the potential to be a game changes in the treatment and monitoring of the condition.

The Cordella Pulmonary Artery Pressure Sensor detects changes in the health of patients with heart failure and securely transmits the information to the care team for review. If a change is detected, the team can then make changes to medications or other clinical interventions to prevent a heart failure flare-up requiring urgent hospitalisation. Click here for more.

Safe Staffing Framework GUH

Safe staffing is a National framework adapted by the Department of Health in 2018 and is rolled out on all Medical and Surgical wards in GUH.

Trendcare is a database that utilises a systematic, evidence based approach to determine Nurse / HCA staffing requirements based on patient acuity and dependency levels and has proven to stabilize the workforce, enhance patient care and increase staff satisfaction.

For the last number of months GUH have been engaging with staff and providing education and training sessions and responding to Staff needs.

Trendcare roster has now been implanted into all Medical and Surgical wards in and is the only roster used in GUH now. Data went live in June 2023 on 8 wards.

Phase two of the safe staffing framework is due to be rolled out in the Emergency Department in the middle of the summer. It is the future goal to implement the Safe Staffing Framework into all Hospitals and Community care settings.

SUH Herb Project





Dietary restrictions play a vital role in the successful long-term management of chronic kidney disease. Reducing salt intake is particularly important for the management of high blood pressure. High blood pressure is common in kidney disease. Therefore dietitians recommend that patients on dialysis (a type of treatment for end stage kidney disease) stop using salt and avoid eating salty foods. This is, in addition to other individualised dietary restrictions (potassium, phosphate, and fluid) depending on the patient's condition. The resulting renal diet can be bland and lacking in flavour, as well as limited in foods. Fresh herbs are a wonderful way of boosting the natural flavour of food, especially when one is following a low-salt diet.

Engaging in gardening activities and the natural environment provides a chance to take part in a meaningful occupation.

Liz Rafferty, Renal Dietitian and Treasa Purcell, Occupational Therapist at SUH developed the idea of creating a herb project to benefit their patients where patients could see the herbs being planted, grown, and then take some for their own use. Managers and the Sligo Branch of The Irish Kidney Association encouraged developing the project proposal and committed their support.

The 80-page report details the challenges, progress and successes of the programme, from rapidly setting up vaccination centres and satellite centres, ensuring a constant vaccine supply chain and reacting to peaks and sudden troughs of demand including vaccinating a peak of 42,000 people per week at the height of the programme.

How did you get interested in the role of Nurse Practice Development Coordinator?

As an Intensive Care Nurse, I have cared for patients on their organ donation journey. The strength and kindness of bereaved families that consider and agree to organ donation is awe-inspiring. Their willingness to save the lives of others during their unexpected grief is truly humbling. The remarkable acts of Organ Donors and their families were my inspiration and motivation to become an Organ Donation Nurse Manager.



What is a typical day?

My working day is varied and unpredictable which I enjoy. Flexibility is essential in order to support organ donation assessments and referrals which are always my priority.

I receive a call from a nurse or doctor in an Intensive Care Unit or Emergency Department in one of the five hospitals within the Saolta University Healthcare Group, notifying me of a potential donation case.

The clinical history is discussed and I note any details which may be relevant in assessing the suitability of the patient. I provide clinical advice on the management of the patient's physiological parameters to ensure organ donation can be explored. Once on site, I meet with the healthcare team in the ICU and get a comprehensive handover to enable me to assess the possibility of donation. Family conversations regarding donations are provided with great care and attention. A key part of my role is attending end-of-life discussions with the patient's family and offer organ donation as an option. When a family agrees to proceed with organ donation, I facilitate the completion and submission of the referral to Organ Donation Transplant Ireland. Supporting families involves clear and timely communication underpinned by specialist knowledge of the organ donation process. I am available throughout the process to answer questions that the family may have. I provide our Irish Hospice Foundation awarded 'Thinking of You Memory Making Initiative as part of our end-of-life care to all organ donor families within the Saolta University Health Care Group.

I remain in the ICU up until the time of the arrival of the National Procurement Service. I meet with the family for the final time and thank them for considering and agreeing to organ donation.

I work with a very supportive team in my base hospital at University Hospital Galway. I am also very fortunate to be part of a network of five other Organ Donation Nurse colleagues nationally who are highly skilled clinical experts. Our aim is to ensure that organ donation is considered where appropriate.

If you had to describe your job in three words... or one sentence... what would it be?

I would describe my role as continually evolving, and inspiringly challenging with a great sense of purpose that drives my motivation.

What is the most rewarding part of your job?

Although many may see my role as very sad in dealing with deceased patients and grieving families. I feel honoured and privileged in fulfilling an organ donor's final wish and I have often been fortunate to witness the solace and comfort organ donation gives to bereaved families left behind.



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
